What we've heard so far

- During and after the first AAROM National Meeting, the response to the AAROM Fund has been diverse – excitement mixed with concern
- Key issues raised include:
 - A proposal driven process could foster competition rather than collaboration among AAROM departments
 - Some AAROM departments may be at a disadvantage, based on size, capacity and/or location, creating “winners and losers”
 - Will increase proposal writing workload without a guarantee of success, and if successful, will face an increase in reporting burden
 - Since plenty of funding programs are now available, need to focus on AAROM-specific capacity development, AAROM collaboration, and partnership development, including leveraging funds
 - Increase co-design, co-develop and co-delivery approach
- All important factors to consider, today and going forward, regarding the design and implementation of the AAROM Fund



Overview of AAROM Fund & Next Steps

- Annual Budget of \$2.5M (regular turnover of funding/projects)
- Application/proposal-based process for single or multi-year projects/activities (2-3 years)
- National process, guidelines and criteria (i.e., transparent, predictable, equitable)
- Spectrum of activities supported (addressing different capacity levels – not just high capacity)
- Annual priority setting process during the AAROM National Meeting (what we are doing today)
- Joint application review committee with Indigenous experts
- Inaugural Request for Proposals (RFP) in January 2020 for projects starting in 2020-21



General Considerations

- What project activities would be unique to the AAROM program (i.e., not backfilling for other programs)?
- How can the AAROM fund serve as a catalyst to support ongoing capacity development for individual AAROM departments and across the network?
- How can it address immediate needs/problems, create tools and solutions, develop partnerships, and unlock other sources of funding?



Activity Streams - Potential

Taking a thematic, priority-based approach that can evolve over time and be reviewed each year at this meeting. Some possible examples include:
